<b>Class number 1-2: University of Crete/Sassari</b>  <u>From Empires to Emergencies: Historical Patterns of Crisis, Power, and Adaptation</u> (Roman Empire, Medieval Kingdoms to World Wars)  Description: This lecture explores how societies and political systems have historically responded to crises — from global wars and economic depressions to ideological and environmental upheavals. Drawing parallels between past transitions and current uncertainties (such as the Russia–Ukraine war and the environmental crisis), it invites reflection on how historical insights can guide modern resilience and policy design.	2h	21.04.2025
<b>Class number 3-4: University of Lyon II</b>  <u>Geopolitics of Uncertainty: Power, Populism, and Policy in a Fragmenting World</u>  Description: This lecture analyzes how global political structures and ideologies evolve under pressure from new risks — including the Russia–Ukraine war, the Palestinian conflict, and climate-driven instability. It explores how populism, nationalism, and shifting alliances redefine the international order and the global governance of risk.	2h	22.04.2025
<b>Class number 5-6: University of Lodz/University of Lyon II/University of Crete/Sassari</b>  <u>Online workshop for students:</u>  Aim: To help students understand how economic systems, political decisions, and historical patterns shape the global risks we face today.  Students are assigned to 4 groups (across universities) and have to work with a scenario such as:  Scenario A: A global climate-driven energy crisis Scenario B: Disruptive AI replacing 30% of jobs Scenario C: A new financial shock in developing economies Scenario D: A geopolitical turmoil (e.g., nuclear war) affecting supply chains	2h	23.04.2025
